The inclusion of informal settlements surrounding Primrose represents a significant and welcomed shift for community leadership, fostering the vision of an inclusive and united community. Continued engagement with the Mayor's Office remains a priority, as we eagerly anticipate the signing of the long-awaited Memorandum of Understanding (MOU). The Primrose Residents' Association (PRA) has embraced the Mayor's Office's initiatives to address challenges such as vacant properties and hijacked buildings, paving the way for the Germiston City Upliftment Project. With the steadfast support of the community, we are optimistic about reclaiming our neighborhoods and ensuring equitable service delivery for all residents.

Battle over liquor continues with some interesting developments



Our meetings with the Gauteng Liquor Board are both positive and constructive, addressing pressing concerns and paving the way for meaningful progress. Key highlights included valuable input from the MMC for Public Safety and officials, who engaged seriously with the challenges raised. Notable next steps include a report-back meeting every Monday and the establishment of a multi-disciplinary task team. Updates on the impending amendment of the Gauteng Liquor Act of 2003 and the involvement of the PRA, and the setup of a corruption inquiry further signify progress. WASSA advocated for a Liquor Board website to empower communities through transparency and emphasized linking license renewals to community input, ensuring accountability, and addressing antisocial behavior. All stakeholders are hopeful for stabilizing areas and safeguarding communities through firm action and long-term solutions
